THE POLITICAL ECONOMY OF THE EUROPEAN UNION

This course examines the origins and evolution of the European Union since its inception with particular reference to structural changes since the end of the Cold War. The impact of the Single European Act (SEA) and the Maastricht, Amsterdam, Nice and Lisbon treaties will be assessed in relation to the tension between supra-national and intergovernmental perspectives.

The question of whether Europe is likely to become a fully-fledged federation, a confederation, or something else lies at the heart of the debate arising from the current fiscal crisis and the European Union's response to it.

Are we seeing the renationalisation of policy and the rejection of supra-nationalism by European states engaged in the operation of the Euro-zone?
